Give a Book is a charity that promotes books and the pleasure of reading in the hardest to reach places. Our core belief is that to pass on a good read – to give a book – is a transaction of lasting worth. We work in prisons, schools and with disadvantaged children & young people throughout the UK.

'One in 11 (9.4%) children and young people said they do not have a book of their own at home, rising to one in eight (13.1%) children from disadvantaged backgrounds.'

Our year at Larkspur Primary

We began working with Larkspur Primary in the summer of 2020. Children had missed months of school and it felt more important than ever to reconnect them with books and the pleasure of reading.


Over the year we collaborated on many projects with Larkspur: book gifts at Christmas, a book group, author visits, a creative book cover design project and most importantly a brand new library space for the children to enjoy.

When we first spoke to the headteacher at Larkspur, in the summer of 2020, we discussed the power of books and what their presence in the school would mean to the children. Larkspur is in a place where there is little aspiration for further education or careers outside the local area. Books were not only the key to escape figuratively speaking, but

also something that would help the children look beyond the borders of their town and out into the world. We watched Larkspur grow into a reading school, putting books and the pleasure of reading at its heart.

Breakfast Book Clubs provide books for children in primary school, hungry in all sorts of ways. They have been our staple school project for nearly eight years, and we have created Breakfast Book Clubs in over 30 schools across the UK. We work with schools with a higher than average number of children on free school meals. Back in 2020 our crowdfunding campaign, 'Breakfast is fully BOOKED', exceeded our initial target for setting up 10 new Breakfast Book Clubs. Despite another challenging start to the year and the considerable hardships that schools have faced, we were delighted to set up Breakfast Book Clubs in Harwich, Folkestone, and Birmingham in the spring.

With the closure of libraries and bookshops at the start of the year, schools were the only place where some young children could access and explore the world of books.

Since spring, we have set up four more Breakfast Book Clubs, with more in progress to reach our crowdfunding target.

Pleasure of Reading Prize

At a time when we were all reminded of the power of books to combat isolation and pleasure felt a long way off, Give a Book announced the Pleasure of Reading Prize. The prize was inspired by *The Pleasure of Reading*, edited by our patron, Antonia Fraser.

The Reading Prize is divided equally between an author 'who gives pleasure through their work' and a Give a Book project of their choice.

It is sponsored by Bloomsbury Publishing and generously supported by the Blavatnik Family Foundation.

Prison Reading Groups, 'the biggest best friend' to Give a Book, first collaborated in 2012 and officially joined us in 2017.

Before lockdown, Prison Reading Groups had 50 groups running in 40 prisons, facilitated by prison staff and often an external volunteer. When prisoners could no longer meet face to face, we found new ways for members to connect through books. PRG's remote support came in the form of **Book Talk**, a monthly resource that provides suggested titles and notes for written responses that can be shared. Prison libraries were closed to prisoners for many months during the pandemic, so PRG created resources to help them choose books remotely. We commissioned Finding a Good Read videos that were broadcast on prison TV and we created a monthly column in Inside Time, the national prisoners' newspaper.

PRG's annual Reading in Prison event went virtual this year. The theme, Reading Lessons: Lockdown and Beyond, kicked off with a powerful introduction from Gabriel Krauze, author of Booker Prize long-listed Who They Was, about how books connect us, 'Whatever you're going through you can find it in books that make you realise you're not alone'.

Prisons are still only gradually returning to pre-pandemic life. PRG and Give a Book have also worked hard to keep prisoners connected to their children through books. We've provided them for video visits and mailouts and we will be supporting up to 20 Christmas Family Days with books, bags and volunteers. We are thrilled that some in-person reading groups have resumed and look forward to supporting the festive Family Days planned over Christmas

Books for First Nighters

Since it began in 2017, Books for First Nighters has provided books for those on their first night in custody with the aim of offering some comfort and mental release to the new arrivals. We hope that this facilitates the relationship between staff and inmates. We feel that the act of giving the new prisoner a book – or letting them choose a book – goes some way to ease the difficult and traumatic transition into prison life. The project is now running in over 32 prisons throughout the UK.

Making it Up

We started Making it Up (MIU) in 2018 in HMP Wormwood Scrubs – connecting families through stories. With prison consultant David Kendall, we held workshops for prisoner parents to create storybooks for their children.

In 2020 we devised an in-cell version. David wrote a sympathetic set of instructions and we included pre-paid envelopes so that the finished storybooks could be sent home. These lockdown storybooks have been quite beautiful, clearly coming from a place of pride in the work and love. In summer 2021, we were

able to put up an exhibition of MIU stories so far.

Making it Up runs remotely in eight more prisons.

Volunteering with Give a Book

We have a lot to thank our volunteers for this year. They are a group of like-minded individuals, passionate about books and reading and play a crucial role in many of our projects. This year our in-person volunteer opportunities, running reading groups and helping us pack and distribute books were still on pause.
